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(5) Restoration activities shall begin within 90 days after the completion of the well. Once completion activities have begun, they shall be completed within 30 days. All wellhead and surface equipment will be painted to blend with the environment according to BLM and county recommendations and regulations.

11. Other Information. The topography of the general area is mountainous and cut with numerous canyons. The soils in this semi-arid area are of the Green River Formation (Tertiary) consisting of light brownish-gray clays (OL) to sandy soils (SM-ML) with poorly graded gravels. Outcrops of sandstone ledges, conglomerate deposits and shale are common in this area. The topsoils in the area range from sandy clay (SM-ML) to clayey (OL) soil.

Vegetation in the area consists of fir trees and grasses and low ground cover in the clearings. There are also juniper and pinion pine forests as the primary flora with areas of sagebrush, rabbit brush, some grasses and cacti. Removal of the ground cover will be required in the pad area, but will be kept to a minimum and conform to BLM regulations.

Fauna of the area consists of coyotes, rodents, birds, and fauna connected with high altitude environment. Access to the well is across Federal leases. Surface and mineral ownership lies with the Federal Government. O.D. Presley is lessee of Oil and Gas rights.

The majority of the washes and streams in the area are of an intermittent nature, flowing only during the early spring runoff and during heavy rains of long duration, which are extremely rare. The normal annual rainfall in the area is only 3". East Douglas Creek is the only perennial stream within 5 miles of the well site.

There are no occupied dwellings in the general area. There are no visible archeological, historical or cultural sites within reasonable proximity to the proposed location site.
